And of course you - the members and friends of PMUC - come to church in the hope that you will leave changed for the better after an hour in the pews. Somehow renewed, somehow challenged to grow in spirit, somehow eased of stress or pain, in order to start the week refreshed. It is my hope you find what you seek.

A month of faith. A month of hope. Gosh, I can hardly wait for November's theme and to see how it develops.

So, then, imagine my surprise. Imagine my surprise when I wandered into the halls of a new place, a precious, old sanctuary. I was wary, but hopeful. I knew I'd have to prove myself—doesn't everyone? I knew it'd take years to shape the love I wanted from a place of faith, but I was ready and willing to work, I was ready and willing to love without love until it blossomed. I was ready and willing to work for the love.

I came into that place, and I was greeted with embraces. Those aspects of myself that I have had to fight for, over and over and over again in this life, to be treated with dignity and respect and love were things that the sanctuary's people embraced. They loved me not "in spite of," but because of. They didn't blink when I told them I was getting married to a woman, that I loved her with my whole heart, that I loved the Goddess, that I was a Witch. They hugged me close, and they told me "welcome," and "you're safe here," and "we're so glad you're here."

They told me "you are needed," "you are precious," "you are part of us, and we are part of you."

Imagine my surprise when I was greeted with enthusiasm when I brought up hesitant ideas my very first day. Imagine my surprise when what I said was listened to, when I was told that I had worth, even though I'd just arrived.

The people here have an easy sense of humor. They're intelligent beyond belief. They are warm and friendly and hospitable and ridiculously wonderful. They're the type of people who top off your coffee and worry about you getting home safely and want to know all the details about your lesbian wedding. Within five minutes of introduction, they're laughing with you like they've known you forever. ...They're Unitarian Universalists.

I have never felt so safe, so nurtured, so part of a community than I have in our weeks at Pullman Memorial Universalist Church, and I have been to many, many spiritual gatherings, camps, seminars, circles. When Jenn and I walk through those beautiful, arched doors each Sunday morning, we're greeted like we're part of a family of faith.

Because we are.

Last Sunday, Jenn and I lit our two candles from the chalice. Our pastor, Lee, with a wide grin welcomed us into the church. "You are part of us, and we are part of you," he said, the entire congregation repeating the words. Afterward, we held warm cups of coffee and tea in the beautiful, expansive hall that will house the joyous beings who come to celebrate our wedding. Jenn and I measured the walls (again), talking to Bill about rainbow banners and unicorn decorations, laughing over little things, strawberry jelly (you would have had to be there), leaving after hugs were exchanged, talking about the book club...

To the sunny parking lot across the street where a dead car waited for us.

"I have jumper cables," said Lee, taking off his tweed jacket, rolling up his sleeves. And, in minutes, the car miraculously started.

I suppose you could be scientific and say: it started because the battery gave it life. I'd rather be sentimental:

I'd asked the Goddess: I feel lonely, spiritually. My priestess friends, my witch loves, my coven sisters are so far from me. I need something here. I need something now. Please. ...Please?

And the gay marriage bill was passed, and the wedding was arranged, and the little drive through the country that fateful Sunday, many months ago, found a beautiful little church in the middle of nowhere, with a family waiting for us.

The car totally started on the love of community and Unitarian Universalist Awesome.

(With maybe a LITTLE bit of help from the battery.)

You Are Invited to a Dual Installation Ceremony

There is a great deal of excitement in the air as the date approaches for the dual installation service on Sunday, October 9 at 2:00 pm at the church! We have a lot of participants including Reverend Richard Hood, Pastor Lee Richards, Susan Daiss, Harriet Greaser on organ, Diana Dudley on piano, Maarit Vaga (singer), and others! Following the service, a reception will follow and cake will be served. Members of the congregation are asked to bring offerings of cheese and crackers for the reception. Reverend Richard Hood served at this church from 1971 – 2006, 35 years, and in that time, his considerable talents, speaking ability, leadership, and devotion helped us through the good and bad years. He is responsible for the Talk-back Sundays, Pullman Pennies (as a strategy to make tough decisions), the long-range plan, the Covenant (which appears in each hymnal), the closing circle on some Sundays, and so on. And he presided over the Good Friday service for all of his years here. All a pulpit-fill minister is asked to do is to come and preach on certain Sundays, but Dick went above and beyond consistently because he cares about this faith community. Dick was honored several times for his service to this church, but now he will receive one of the most prestigious

honors that can be conferred upon a minister – Minister Emeritus. This honor designates him as our minister for life. And he deserves this and so much more. This is given to him with the utmost respect and love, and gratitude for his many contributions.

Pastor Lee Richards has been serving as our called minister for about six months now and this will be his formal installation ceremony. Lee has consistently amazed us with his energy and talents! He has updated the website, created a Facebook page, attended the Board meetings and other District meetings, he has been out in the community introducing himself and getting to know the area, has submitted articles to the paper advertising special events, taken a leadership role at the Ministerium meetings, and so much more! "Help Us Help You"

The above is the name for a new fund-raising campaign intended to benefit all who pass through our doors. Because Pullman Memorial Universalist Church is a public institution, it behooves us to think ahead on the safety of everyone who uses our facility. To that end, the Board of Trustees has approved purchasing an AED - an automated external defibrillator.

AEDs are portable "heart-shockers" that can save a life by saving precious minutes when responding to someone who has collapsed because of heart failure. The unit is capable of diagnosing the life-threatening cardiac arrhythmias of ventricular fibrillation and ventricular tachycardia, and then applying electrical stimulation to stop the arrhythmia and return the heart to a normal cardiac heartbeat.

AEDs come with easy instructions, and 5-year batteries, but are not inexpensive. Obtaining a unit will cost about \$1350.00 which is not a budgeted item. So here's the deal - we want to raise the funds completely through donations. Any donations made using the PayPal button on the church website will automatically be earmarked for the AED. We also invite you to make a donation by check (heck - we'll even accept cash!) - just be sure to notate "AED" so we'll know to add it to the special fund. As soon as we've raised the funds we'll acquire the device.

So Help Us Help You - after all, you never know what "heart-stopping" event may transpire when at church!

Project Life – International War Orphans Program

At the special service on 9/11, Linda Redfield Shakoor, from the Moslem Mosque in Waterport, mentioned to Pastor Lee that they participate with a group called 'Project Life' This group brings refugees from Afghanistan and other war zones, ages 8-12, to the United States to live with volunteer families for several months to benefit from a therapeutic program to recover their health and strength and

just be kids. Every new conflict or natural disaster throughout the world creates thousands of victims, and children suffer the most. They experience the loss of a parent, homelessness, hunger, and injuries. Project Life is an intensive, volunteer-based program that works to help restore the lost childhood of these innocent victims. For three months, they experience rest and recovery in the Western New York countryside. They make new friends and learn new skills, and just have fun. Linda mentioned to Pastor Lee that the children would love to come to PMUC and show us a slide presentation, but that they would be leaving in several weeks, so Lee suggested they come the following week on 9/18/11.

So Linda, the children and their volunteer parents did attend our service on that day, and they did have a slide presentation for us. Linda showed us pictures of some of the war-torn places that these children witnessed in their native countries. We saw the destruction and devastation. And then we saw some slides of these children here in the US attending birthday parties, learning in their classes, at Strong Museum and Brown's Berry Patch, and having a lot of fun. And the children of some of the host parents got up and gave testimonials about how having a guest from another country has changed their life. One young lady tearfully read a letter and said that she has learned so much and would miss them terribly. These children would be leaving in a few short days to return home. Hopefully, they will return with new strength, greater confidence, and hope that comes from knowing they have friends in another part of the world. What a wonderful experience it was for us at PMUC to meet these wonderful, beautiful children and their host families! Many thanks to Linda Redfield Shakoor for this incredible presentation, and we wish them luck in this effort. We hope to engage in other mutual programs in the future with the Moslem Mosque in Waterport. Eye on the Board of Trustees

-from the meeting on 9/18/11

***Ministerial report** – Pastor Lee Richards gave an overview of his work since the last Board meeting. He conducted one worship service, and held a special interfaith worship service (jointly with other area ministers) in remembrance of 9/11. He has attended about five different meetings. He has submitted items for the Newsletter, continued to update Facebook and the PMUC website. He has submitted articles to the newspaper regarding the 9/11 service and the 9/18 service (with the war orphans in attendance). He has coordinated efforts with Susan Daiss and Rev. Richard Hood regarding the 10/9 service, and has had contact with organist Steven Seigart from the Eastman School of Music regarding a possible recital at PMUC . Lee invited Linda Redfield Shakoor from the Waterport Mosque to have their children from ‘Project Life’ (war orphans from Afghanistan, Ingushetia, and other war zones) come and do a slide presentation during the 9/18 church service. Lee requested that one board member commit to attend GUSTO meetings once a month, and Dennis Seekins volunteered. Lee also requested that we donate the offering for the 9/18 service to the war orphans, and it was decided that the loose money collected will be designated for that purpose.

*Motion was made and carried to approve Pastor Lee’s request to be authorized to vote at the NYSCU Annual Meeting in Binghamton .

*** Update on the Installation Service** – this dual service is scheduled for October 9, 2011 at 2 pm. Harriet Greaser will be playing an intricate organ piece, and Diana Dudley will also be performing.. Maarit Vaga, soprano, will be singing. The program is pretty well set. Opening words will be offered by C.W. Lattin, and smaller sermons will be given by Susan Daiss, Pastor Lee Richards, and Rev. Richard Hood. Invitations will be sent to the local Ministerium, past members, the UU District, and others. Chris said she can call or e-mail some members who have had some affiliation with Rev. Hood. Fees for the organist and vocalist were discussed. A cake is set to be ordered from Tops with a picture of the church on the top of the cake.

*** Update on the Grant Proposal** - Andrea Rebeck attended the meeting and appraised us on her progress. She did receive a requested report from the architects, but further clarification will be needed. The new application is about 75% similar to the last one, but the focus has changed to a more tourism focus rather than a preservation focus. The resolution letter will have to be redone when more information is determined. Andrea asked the Board to agree on a ceiling amount for the matching funds that we will be responsible for. A motion was made and approved to commit \$150,000 of PMUC ’s funds towards this grant. If our grant application is accepted for the full amount and we decide we don’t wish to accept it, we can decline. Andrea will look into a grant for \$100,000 for the matching funds, and we may need to raise \$50,000 or more. C.W. Lattin suggested that we look into hiring a professional fund-raiser. If the grant is accepted, we will need to do a larger scale fund-raising project than we have ever undertaken.

***Finance Committee report** – the committee has met with one financial advisor and will be meeting with another one soon. Chairman Chris requested that an audit of the books be performed. Pastor Lee noted that the UUA recommends a professional audit every three years. It was also requested that the Finance Committee investigate some computer software programs for bookkeeping. Chris requested that the Finance Committee also work on following-through with the items that have been voted on at the Annual Meeting. A full report will be due in January.

***Breast Cancer Walk** – is scheduled to take place at Watts on Sunday, October 16. As with previous years, PMUC plans to have a team and participate.
