It would be well worth it to read his books. Diana Dudley mentioned that she sees Helen Keller as hero and inspiration as well.
- Susan Frawley – is holding the family of a young boy who lost his life too soon in her heart. She was referring to the 7-year-old boy whose life was taken by his mother. This is such a sad tragedy for the family and the community.
- Chris Loss – had a scare with her grandson's health, but he is fine. It turns out that he had a night terror. Thank goodness he's ok!



April 15th – *Services Canceled*

April 22nd

- Rich Della Costa – talked about the incident at a Starbucks where two black youths were arrested for supposedly loitering. He was listening to a discussion about this on NPR and heard comments from several people. One African American caller was telling about advice his father gave him, that he should always buy something when going to any shop or somehow make it clear that he isn't just hanging out. And he bought more items through the years that he didn't need or want just to avoid trouble. Rich observed that racism is alive and well, and in light of our current political situation, there is a lot of work yet to be done. I know we all long for the day when racism is a thing of the past.
- Debby Rodrigues – in watching how the Quator family has navigated a mostly conservative community, it is heartening that there are kind and caring people. And she wanted to thank everyone who has helped out with their family home. . . looks super!
- Diana Dudley – spoke to Carlos Burroughs, Sara's son, who was present in church. Sara would have turned 85 years old today. Sara is very much missed. She was a wonderful, amazing woman. Chris Loss said that we will miss her great energy and humor. She had done so much for this church in the past! Diana asked Carlos what he would like the monetary contributions in Sara's honor to be used for, and he said he will speak to his family and let us know.
- Susan Daiss – spoke about her connection to Sara Burroughs through Sara's granddaughter Liz (Veronica's daughter). Liz also works at the Memorial Art Gallery, and has shared stories about Sara's beloved dog, playing in the basement, and so much more. Susan promised to mention that it would have been Sara's birthday today.
- Mark Crosby – recounted that when he was in rehab, about 60% of the residents were African American. One time, Mark mentioned that he understood their experience because he is gay. And he was politely told that he has no idea what it is like to face racial discrimination. While he can make the choice to reveal being gay or not, they cannot change what they look like. And the experience is ongoing.

Through Debby Rodrigues, they asked that our members light a candle, say a prayer, or take a minute to meditate on the anguish they were feeling in the aftermath of the US military's bombing of Syria. Riyadh's mother and siblings are still there and they were weeping with worry for them. This must be horrible for them to go through!



Please join us for the next Book Discussion, which will be held on May 6th at 9:30 am. *All are free to join even if you have not read the book.*

The book to be discussed is *Just Mercy: A Story of Justice and Redemption* by Bryan Stevenson. Jessica George will lead the group.



Bryan Stevenson was a young lawyer when he founded the Equal Justice Initiative, a legal practice dedicated to defending those most desperate and in need: the poor, the wrongly condemned, and women and children trapped in the farthest reaches of our criminal justice system. One of his first cases was that of Walter McMillian, a young man who was sentenced to die for a notorious murder he insisted he didn't commit. The case drew Bryan into a tangle of conspiracy, political machination, and legal brinkmanship—and transformed his understanding of mercy and justice forever. (Retrieved 2/26/18, Amazon)
